# Freedom of Information request: Right to know request

Thank you for your request for information under the Freedom of Information Act 2000 ('the FOI Act').

We received this request on 24 June 2025.

### Your request

Although you treated my request as a SAR under Article 15 GDPR, some of the redacted material may be disclosable under the Freedom of Information Act 2000. I therefore now make a parallel request under FOIA for material that is not classified as personal data but which involves discussions or internal documents about me or my business activities.

### Our response

Please be advised that the PSA has now ceased to exist and as such some records within prescribed retention periods will be passed onto Ofcom in due course – we are in a transition period. We note that your FOI Act request asks for information relating to your business but excluding personal data, and therefore we would need to do a fresh search for information that fits within this scope.

We consider that Section 12 of the FOI Act applies to your request as a considerable amount of time would be needed to locate, retrieve, identify and extract any relevant information. Section 12 of the FOI Act provides that a public authority is not obliged to comply with a request for information if the authority estimates that the cost of complying with the request would exceed the "appropriate limit". The appropriate limit is set out in the Freedom of Information and Data Protection (Appropriate Limit and Fees) Regulations 2004, and is, for Ofcom, £450. That sum is intended to cover the estimated costs involved in determining whether Ofcom holds the information requested, identifying, locating, retrieving and extracting the information from any document containing it. The Regulations provide that costs are to be estimated at a rate of £25 per person per hour.

Ofcom estimates that it would take at least 18 hours to identify, locate and extract the information you require and as such the cost of complying with your request will exceed the appropriate limit. We will therefore not be able to provide any information in connection to your request.

If you wish to submit an alternative request with a narrower, more specific scope in relation to this subject, we would be happy to consider it. In any event, with any information requested, exemptions may apply. For example, we are prohibited from disclosing information related to a business under section 393 of the Communications Act 2003 and thereby Section 44 of the FOI Act, unless we have the consent of that business or one of the statutory gateways under section 393(2) of the Act is met. In addition, the exemptions under S40 relating to personal (third party)

information, S42 relating to legal advice and S36 relating to free and frank exchange of views may apply.

When considering whether to provide consent, please note that it is our general policy to publish FOI Act responses including any documents that may be released.

## Information Requests

#### Request an internal review

If you are unhappy with the response you have received to your request for information, or think that your request was refused without a reason valid under the law, you may ask for an internal review. If you do, it will be subject to an independent review within Ofcom. We will either uphold the original decision, or reverse or modify it.

If you would like to ask us to carry out an internal review, you should get in touch within two months of the date of this letter. There is no statutory deadline for us to complete our internal review, and the time it takes will depend on the complexity of the request. But we will try to complete the review within 20 working days (or no more than 40 working days in exceptional cases) and keep you informed of our progress. #### Taking it further

If you are unhappy with the outcome of our internal review, then you have the right to complain to the Information Commissioner's Office.
