Response

ITSPA welcomes the opportunity to respond to Ofcom's consultation on the Physical Infrastructure Market Review. As a general principle, members of ITSPA welcome Ofcom's efforts to improve broadband speeds and to increase the level of competition within the UK's telecoms infrastructure. However, there are several points that ITSPA would like to make.

Access on the terms set out in the proposals to BT's duct and pole infrastructure undoubtedly reduces the cost of network deployment materially. However, the consequence is that it would disincentivise new infrastructure build – the time and cost of building relative to consuming existing duct may not always be a rational decision. This would mean that there would be a regulator endorsed self-fulfilling prophecy of an infrastructure (and ancillary services) monopoly. We would suggest that not enough analysis or debate on this point has been performed and we encourage Ofcom to look into this further.

A further point ITSPA would like to highlight is the potential for game-playing. This issue cuts both ways, with there being an incentive for operators to consume PIA on key, congested, routes purely for the purpose of blocking the competition. Equally, there is an incentive on BT's downstream divisions to do the same, thus having the consequence of favouring its active products. BT, as a historically unwilling landlord, is also free, on prima facie read of the SMP conditions, to impose disincentives to consume PIA such as disproportionate bonds or guarantees for use of sub-duct.
