Spectrum, particularly in the 4W upper portion of the 5.8GHz band, is a very scarce resource that is heavily used for broadband provision in rural and remote parts of the country. Relief would be very welcome.
Question 4: Are there any other considerations that you believe need to be taken into account and that are not already covered in this consultation?	Confidential? – N The notch is inconveniently placed with 70MHz below and 35MHz above useable for BFWA. Even where voluntary spectrum coordination happens at dense installations, this arrangement prevents efficient allocation in 20MHz bands for the lower portion and even 10MHz bands for the upper. Allowing the use of 5795-5815 would therefore facilitate more efficient sharing among BFWA users.

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
