Ofcom notes on the request

The request was AGREED, because Ofcom was satisfied in relation to Section 106 (1A)(a) of the Broadcasting Act 1990 (as modified by the Community Radio Order 2004, and further modified by the Community Radio (Amendment) Orders 2010 and 2015) i.e. that the change would not substantially alter the character of the service, and for the policy reasons given below.

The Licensee is requesting to convert its Key Commitments for locally produced and original output from daily to weekly requirements, with locally produced output also being reduced from 13 hours per day (91 hours per week equivalent) to 70 hours per week. The Licensee is requesting this change in order to give it more flexibility to deal with fluctuations in volunteer availability and to deliver its requirements for original output and locally-produced output across the week.

We are generally happy to approve requests to convert a daily original output requirement to a weekly requirement, understanding that this provides greater flexibility to stations in managing their resources over the course of a week without affecting the service provided to listeners. We are also satisfied that the reduction in the locally-produced output requirement over the course of each week will not substantially alter the character of the service, and we recognise that changing economic circumstances affect the amount of time volunteers can dedicate to a station.

The Licensee is also requesting a minor change to its character of service, to include "a particular focus on over-45s". In requesting this change, the Licensee has stated that it is seeking to reach a slightly younger audience from its target community in order to sustain the service. Ofcom is satisfied that this change does not constitute a substantial change to the Licensee's character of service, and that the change may encourage a broader part of the community to interact with the service.

The Licensee is also seeking to amend its music requirement to replace reference to "MOR music and easy listening" with "AC (adult contemporary) music". In requesting this change, the Licensee has stated that it anticipates reaching a wider audience with "music from the 1950s to the present day in daytime output". Whilst we note that the requested change constitutes a change to the type of music that will be played across the week, we do not believe that this constitutes a substantial change to the Licensee's character of service to inform and entertain adults in Lincoln.

In terms of our policy criteria, Ofcom is satisfied that the changes will not affect the station's ability to meet the community radio 'characteristics of service' set out in the legislation, and there are no other policy criteria which would prevent us from implementing this change. We therefore decided to exercise our discretion to approve this change.
